

SECURITY & DEFENCE PLUS SEED GRANTS 2026: STAGE 1 GUIDELINES

About Security & Defence PLS

The PLS Alliance is a longstanding partnership combining the strengths of three leading research universities on three continents – Arizona State University (ASU), King's College London (KCL) and the University of New South Wales (UNSW) – to solve global challenges.

Security & Defence PLS (S&D+) is the flagship program of the PLS Alliance. S&D+ advances research, education, and statecraft in the spirit of AUKUS, an agreement announced in 2021 between Australia, the United Kingdom, and the United States to strengthen diplomatic, security, and defence cooperation in the Indo-Pacific region.

Objectives

Stage 1 Seed Grants are designed to initiate and structure high-potential research partnerships within the S&D+ Research and Partnerships stream, co-led between researchers from at least two of the three PLS Alliance universities (ASU, KCL, and UNSW).

Seed grants aim to accelerate pathways to use, adoption, and investment of research through supporting:

- Partnership formation and trust-building
- Joint problem definition and co-design
- Early validation of relevance, feasibility, and transition pathways
- Preparation for larger-scale S&D+ Stage 2 or external funding opportunities

Expected Outcomes

Funded seed grants are expected to lead to the following outcomes:

- A functioning bi- or tri-lateral collaboration involving researchers from at least two PLS institutions;
- Active engagement of at least one defence-relevant external partner (industry, government, or end-user organisation);
- At least one substantive in-person or hybrid meeting/workshop, enabling:
 - o shared understanding of the problem space
 - o clarification of partner needs and constraints
 - o agreement on next-step opportunities
- A jointly articulated problem statement or opportunity definition, informed by partner input and a co-designed concept for a potential solution, research direction, or capability pathway (could be in the form of a White Paper – see below for details);
- Submission of a pitch to [The Conversation](#) or equivalent in each partner country that highlights the project, with reference to S&D+ seed funding.



White Paper

For the purposes of this seed grant round, white papers are defined as an overview document outlining how the research collaboration offers a solution to a security and defence need. The white paper is written with the goal of submitting to defence agencies and/or government officials to showcase expertise and influence decision-making. The requirements of white papers can vary depending on the specific agency it is submitted to, but typically follows a structured format including an introduction, background information, problem statement, analysis, proposed solutions or recommendations, and a conclusion.

Themes

The seed grants aim to fund collaborations aligned to security and defence. Funded areas are not limited to AUKUS stated priorities. Areas of interest for funding include, but are not limited to:

- Space

- Cyber-Security
- Nuclear Propulsion and Safeguards
- Materials Science
- Hypersonics
- Undersea Robotics Autonomous Systems (AURAS)
- Decision Support Systems

- International Alliances and Security Cooperation
- Disinformation and Narrative Strategy
- Irregular Warfare
- Climate Security
- Human Security
- Mission Engineering

- Underwater Awareness
- GPS-denied Environments
- Competitive State Craft
- Women, Peace and Security

Eligibility

- Projects must be co-led between a minimum of two PLoS institutions, (ASU, KCL, and UNSW). Applications co-led between all three PLoS institutions are preferred/will be prioritised;
- Project teams must include at least one external defence stakeholder partner;
- Co-leads must be salaried staff members at their PLoS institution (adjuncts are not eligible to be a co-lead);
- Co-leads must be citizens or permanent residents of their PLoS institution's country (due to restrictions in the Defence Trade Controls Amendment Bill 2023 and many defence funding opportunities);
- Investigators can be a co-lead on only ONE proposal; and
- Project co-leads must be reasonably available for S&D+ communications opportunities as needed (e.g. short video interview or feature content).

Selection Criteria

Criterion
Project details: security and defence need, partner engagement and co-design quality (50%)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Extent to which the proposal articulates a clear, research-led problem or opportunity of relevance to security and defence, informed by real-world needs. Strength of the proposed collaboration, including evidence of meaningful engagement and co-design between researchers and defence-relevant partners.
Translation pathway, real-world feasibility and sustainability (35%)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Clarity and credibility of the proposed pathway for advancing the research beyond Stage 1 project, including external funding and/or commercial endpoints. Ability to attract or align partner resources or funding to support ongoing collaboration beyond the life of the grant.
Team capability & complementarity (10%)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Suitability, expertise, and complementarity of the project team across participating institutions and partners.
Budget appropriateness (5%)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Extent to which the requested budget is appropriate, well-justified, and aligned with the proposed Stage 1 outcomes.

Funding

≤\$US15,000 total for trilateral projects.

≤\$US10,000 total for bilateral projects.

Eligible items for S&D+ funding:

- Return economy airfares;
- Reimbursement of living and hosting costs of visiting team members from each institution;
- Costs of workshops/meetings related to developing the white paper and other expected outcomes;
- Other reasonable project costs directly relating to delivery of the project.

Grant Duration

The grant duration is six months from the grant commencement date (see timeline below).

Timeline

Dates and times are in the Australian Eastern Standard Time (AEST) zone.

Monday 2 November 2026	Grants end and recipients report against expected outcomes. Final reports due within two weeks of the grant closing.



Application Review

Applications will be assessed by a cross-institutional panel with security and defence expertise.

Reporting

Successful recipients will be required to submit a **Final Report** within two weeks of the project end date detailing progress, outcomes and final financial expenditures against the original budget. A report template will be provided.

All funding must be fully expended within the awarded period. Any unspent funds will be returned.

S&D+ personnel will be available to provide advice on securing external funding for the next steps of your collaboration if required.

Submission

Project teams are required to work together to prepare and submit a single application. The application form and attachments must be submitted as a single PDF and named using the co-lead's surnames i.e. Surname1_Surname2_Surname3_S&D+ Seed Grant 2026.pdf.
